

Country-Level Action Plan for UKRAINE to Prevent and Respond to Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (January-July 2023)

Bearing in mind the evolving security and humanitarian situation in Ukraine, the Country-level Action Plan for the UNCT in Ukraine encompasses the immediate priorities for the first six months of 2023 and will be reviewed mid-year in order to reflect possible re-prioritization following a review of the effectiveness, impact and progress achieved the first half of the year. The prioritization has been harmonized with the Humanitarian Response Plan and will be implemented by individual UN agencies and collectively through the PSEA Network Workplan.
