



CHAD PSEA NETWORK 2024- ACTION PLAN TO PREVENT AND RESPOND TO SEXUAL EXPLOITATION AND ABUSE

The Republic of Chad is ranked 6th Africa HRP Country with High risk of Sexual and Exploitation Abuse as per [2022 IASC Sexual Exploitation and Abuse Risk Overview \(SEARO\) Index](#). The below Work Plan has been developed by the CHAD PSEA Network to prevent, mitigate, and respond to sexual exploitation and abuse (SEA) within the current triple nexus context (Humanitarian -Development and Peace) in CHAD. The five strategic priorities of the Work Plan are in line with DCO/OSCSEA PSEA Results Framework template, the IASC PSEA Acceleration Plan and the “CHAD UNCT-HCT PSEA Strategic Vision 2024-2028. The PSEA Action Plan is steered by the UN Resident Coordinator and Humanitarian Coordinator, with close support from the PSEA Steering Group, the PSEA Network Co-chairs and the Inter-Agency PSEA Coordinator. The objective is to ensure that It reflects UNCT-HCT harmonised approach while fostering Human rights and survivor centered approaches, Gender inclusive design and integrated programming/response between AAP-PSEA-GBV/CP. The global/IASC PSEA indicators meeting the SMART criteria have been selected for tracking progress, mapping results and good practices documentation including result oriented resources mobilisation for collective PSEA program.

It is not intended to replace or duplicate the external reporting obligations that agencies hold, for example the UN reporting of sexual exploitation and abuse allegations to the UN Secretary-General on a quarterly basis.

¹⁰ The Office of the Special Coordinator on improving the UN response to sexual exploitation and abuse (OSCSEA) shared a new guidance note in 2021 on the mandatory requirement for all UN entities on sharing information on allegations of SEA with the Resident Coordinator. The guidance notes also stress that UN agencies need to consult their implementing partners and advise them that information on allegations relating to their personnel will be shared as well. This does not replace external reporting obligations that all agencies hold to report SEA allegations to the UN Secretary-General on a quarterly basis.
