1. PSEA Global Advisory Group good practice presentation

The meeting started with a presentation from the PSEA Global Advisory Group on good practices in Palestine, encouraging Networks to enhance collaboration with and reliance on women-led organizations. The member of the PSEAH Champion Global Advisory group from Palestine presented SAWA. SAWA is one of Palestine's leading organizations, providing mental health support and psychosocial services to Palestinian communities. It provides communities with a free and confidential helpline, through the number 164. It can be used by community members to speak with a social counselor for mental health support, to receive information about humanitarian services, to report complaints of harassment, abuse, or exploitation, and to refer survivors to protection services. SAWA is a widely used channel for reporting SEA in Palestine. The representative of the PSEA Global Advisory Group and the PSEA Network highlighted the great importance of working with local partners, organizations that are working on the ground, to reinforce trust. The SAWA helpline is a core tool of the PSEA Network in Palestine, especially for women, to be able to report without fear of stigmatization or retaliation. Creating a safe and confidential helpline reinforces confidence and trust within communities.

2. Updates from the field

When it comes to challenges, PSEA Coordinators raised the issue of funding, especially highlighting the temporary suspension of US foreign assistance. They mentioned the impact on local NGOs, but also on concrete PSEA actions, such as joint SEA Risk Assessment, PSEA indicator mapping, etc.

PSEA Coordinators are also exploring engagement with the private sector through initiatives like the Connecting Business Initiative. The PSEA Coordinator in Bangladesh highlighted the work of ILO, working alongside companies to establish "Champions" and raise awareness. The Philippines are also engaging with businesses, looking to use sexual harassment as an entry point.

The PSEA Coordinator in Lebanon also shared her experience working with the pool fund. Following the expiration of the current fund for her contract, she mobilized resources via FCDO, channeled through OCHA's pooled humanitarian fund (Lebanon Humanitarian Fund), and will imply double hatting as PSEA

and AAP Coordinator. PSEA in Lebanon is currently being supported by the Lebanese Humanitarian Fund (LHF) and UNICEF. There is a component on capacity building, under the localization agenda of the LHF, on MEAL and accountability on PSEA.

Another significant challenge was translating PSEA documents, particularly in countries with numerous local languages. Some peers shared their good practices. Coordinators mentioned the benefits of developing a PSEA glossary, built with the support of PSEA focal points and communities. The key is to work and adjust the different documentation (glossary, flyers, etc.) with the communities by engaging with them.

Action point: Share the different tools/good practices of PSEA Coordinators in working with the private sector & in the translation of documentation.

3. AOB

- **Point on PSEACap**

The PSEACap roster had been opened for new members in late 2024. Written tests are currently under review. Successful candidates will then go through an interview process. PSEACap has decided to invest in the roster, by diversifying the membership and adding more junior to more experienced members, to share exposure and capacity development with PSEA professionals. According to the PSEACap 2025-26 appeal, the goal is to have 15 deployments in total at any given time, if sufficient funding can be mobilized.

- **Planning survey results: the CoP in 2025**

According to the planning survey, PSEA Coordinators wish to see in 2025, inter alia, updates on global-level discussions, sharing of good practices, and joint meetings with the TAG. Some Coordinators also indicated their availability to share good practices with peers, such as fundraising, victim assistance, and preparedness.

- **Update on the PSEA Coordination Helpdesk**

The IASC and OSCSEA teams provide an update on the PSEA Coordination Helpdesk. Between September to February, the Helpdesk has received 120 requests. PSEA Coordination Helpdesk Clinics have also been conducted in that regard.
